Voting: Voting to elect 2024 officers for the Texas Society for Advancement of Health

Beth Vealé, PhD



Beth Vealé is a professor of Radiologic Sciences in the Shimadzu School of Radiologic Sciences at the Robert D. & Carol Gunn College of Health Sciences and Human Services at Midwestern State University in Wichita Falls, Texas. Dr. Vealé teaches in both the undergraduate and graduate program. She holds a Ph.D. from the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and is nationally certified in Radiography and Quality Management. Her professional experience also includes leadership positions in national

societies such as president of the Association of Collegiate Educators in Radiologic Technology, and Education Chair for the American Society of Radiologic Technologists (ASRT). She has authored multiple peer-review articles and co-authored the textbook, "Digital Imaging and PACS" and presented talks across the United States for 33 years. She is a former member of the ASRT Radiologic Technology Editorial Review Board, a member of the ASRT Research and Grants Advisory Panel, a member of the Journal of Radiology Nursing Editorial Review Board, and is currently an Education Chapter Delegate for the ASRT. Sue Anne Chew is an Associate Professor in the Department of Health and Biomedical Sciences at The University of Texas Rio Grande Valley (UTRGV) and teaches in the BS in Biomedical Sciences (BMED). She obtained a BS in Chemical Engineering from The University of Texas at Austin and a PhD in Bioengineering from Rice University. Her research focuses on the development of biomaterial-based strategies for bone tissue engineering and the treatment of cancer. She is very passionate about getting students involve in research starting at the high school and undergraduate level and is currently the Program Director of the

Biomedical Freshman Research Initiative Program (BFRI) that provides freshmen the opportunity to be exposed to research through their courses at UTRGV. She is also the Program Director of the Rio Grande Valley Bridges to Baccalaureate in Biomedical Sciences Program (B2BMED) which supports the bridging of students from South Texas College (STC) and Texas Southmost College (TSC) into the BMED program at UTRGV. She also enjoys teaching and was a 2019 Regent's Outstanding Teaching Award recipient.

Mohamad Mukhles Tlass, MBA, CPhT, PhTR



Mohamad Mukhles Tlass is currently serving as Assistant Dean of Health Sciences, Therapeutic Departments at Tarrant County College.

Mohamad oversees seven health science programs that include Anesthesia Technology, Central Sterile Processing, Health Information Technology, Medical Assistant, Ophthalmic Technician, Physical Therapy Assistant, and Surgical Technology, and two continuing education programs – Pharmacy Technician and Medical Coder. Prior to Tarrant County College, Mohamad worked at Houston Community College where

he held multiple roles as a faculty member, administrator, district-level administrator, and college administrator. Mohamad's path in higher education started as a part-time lab coordinator in the Pharmacy Technician program, the same program he graduated from in 2003, followed by being appointed as an adjunct in 2005. In 2008, Mohamad transitioned to full-time in the higher education field. During his tenure at Houston Community College, Mohamad served as Lead Hospital Clinical Coordinator, Acting Program Director, Faculty Senate President, the first inclusion fellow who laid the foundation for HCC administration to create and develop DEI practices, and system-wide Interim Dean of Earth, Life, and Natural Sciences Division.

Mohamad strongly believes in the importance of higher education, precisely in health science programs. Mohamad continues to advocate for the support of allied health programs as they are considered essential in the healthcare field, providing critical healthcare services, possessing specialized skills, supporting other healthcare professionals, and contributing to improved patient outcomes and quality of care.
